2. To review other recent impacts on policy

P.A. 18-42: AAC...Members of School Governance Councils and ...Reemployment of Certain Teachers

- Only two sections of Act pertain to education policy
- Specifies that elementary, middle & high school governance councils may include students' parents/guardians who are also public officials
- Extends by two years (to 2020) provision allowing certain retired teachers & administrators to exceed the annual earnings limit without having to pay back the excess to the Teachers Retirement System

P.A.18-51 (continued): Policy for Exclusionary Time Out

The local policies must include, at a minimum, requirements that:

- 1. exclusionary time outs are not to be used as a form of discipline;
- 2. at least one school employee must remain with the student or be immediately available to the student so that the student and employee can communicate verbally throughout the time out;
- 3. the space used for an exclusionary time out is clean, safe, sanitary, and appropriate for calming or deescalating the student's behavior;
- 4. the exclusionary time out period must end as soon as possible (the Act does not include a limit); and
- 5. if the student requires special education services or is being evaluated for them and is awaiting a determination, and the intervention and strategy in use is failing to address the student's problematic behavior, then the student's planning and placement team must meet as soon as is practicable to determine alternative interventions or strategies.

**P.A.18-73: AAC the Sale of
“Connecticut Grown” Products**

- CT farm-to-school program encourages use of CT grown farm products in school cafeterias
- Proof required that the product was produced in Connecticut
- Name of person or business that produced the product, & name and address of the farm where it was produced
- Effective October 1, 2018
- Policy #3542, “Food Service” impacted (an optional policy)

P.A. 18-125 (continued)

The legislation:

- 4. requires the State Department of Education (SDE) to add more information to the guidance it must already provide school districts
- 5. requires boards of education to annually report to CET on using any online service that does not operate under a contract as required by the law and the Act
- 6. adds the Connecticut Association of Schools' executive director, or designee, as a member of the student data privacy task force.

P.A. 18-168 (continued)

- Oral assessment results must be recorded on SBE forms, which specifies risk factors
- School health personnel required to review assessment results
- Changes made to required asthma monitoring system
 - Frequency
 - Removal of some requirements
- Effective July 1, 2018
- Impacts policies:
 - #5141 – Student Health Services (an optional policy)
 - #5141.3 – Health Assessments & Immunizations (an optional policy)

P.A. 18-185 (continued)

- SDE required, in conjunction with DPH, to revise, review, & update its guidelines for managing students with life-threatening food allergies & glycogen storage disease
- Requires school transportation carriers to provide training in identifying & appropriately responding to severe allergic reactions to all school bus drivers
- Bus drivers covered under “Good Samaritan “ law when rendering certain emergency first aid in response to a student’s allergic reaction
